

### I. HISTORICAL DEVELOPMENT OF INTERNATIONAL INSOLVENCY RULES IN SERBIA

- 2004 Law on bankruptcy proceedings the MLCBI has been enacted
- 2011 Law on bankruptcy the same provisions, but with some linguistic improvements
- 2014 new provisions have been introduced
  - Direct international jurisdiction
  - Definition of COMI; registered seat is presumed to be COMI; COMI is determined upon facts existing at the time of filing a request to open bankruptcy proceedings
  - Principle of universality for main bankruptcy proceedings and principle of territoriality for non-main bankruptcy proceedings...


#### II. MAJOR PROBLEMS SINCE 2004

- Rare cases / lack of specific international insolvency knowledge
  - Many international insolvency cases with Montenegro, Croatia and Bosnia and Herzegovina, but without the use of a formal recognition procedure
- Guide to Enactment unknown document for practitioners
- Cooperation and coordination as very unusual way of conducting bankruptcy proceedings for Serbian judges
- Incomplete international insolvency regulation (the MLCBI covers only certain, but not all international insolvency issues)
- Problems with non-main bankruptcy proceedings
  - Can independent non-main proceedings be opened in Serbia?
  - Place of assets as a condition for opening non-main bankruptcy proceedings
- Problems with bankruptcy of companies belonging to the same group of companies
- Foreign creditors are not adequately protected (sometimes foreign creditors try to abuse their rights)

#### III. FUTURE DEVELOPMENTS

- Interaction with the EU Insolvency Regulation
- Possible enactment of the UNCITRAL Model law on Enterprise Group Insolvency and the UNCITRAL Model Law on Recognition and Enforcement of Insolvency-Related Judgments
- More education on international insolvency
