Ceremony		Mr. Koo Sang-yeop is Deputy Minister for Legal Affairs of the Ministry of Justice of the Republic of Korea, appointed in September 2023. Mr. Koo holds a Bachelor's and a Master's degree in Law from Seoul National University. After passing the 39th National Bar Examination in 1997, he has served as a public prosecutor since 2004. Mr. Koo served as the Director of International Legal Affairs Division at the Ministry of Justice in 2016. He also held various leadership positions in the Prosecutors' Office, including Director of Fair Trade and Tax Audit Department (2017), Fair Trade Investigation Department (2018), and Special Investigation Department (2019) at the Seoul Central District Prosecutors' Office. Prior to his appointment as Deputy Minister, he served as the 1st Deputy Chief Prosecutor of Seoul Southern District Prosecutors' Office. Mr. Koo has also devoted himself to studying law while pursuing his career. He earned an LL.M degree at
		Harvard Law School in 2008, a Ph.D. in Civil Law, and a S.J.D. degree in Fair Trade Criminal Law at Seoul National University School of Law in 2012 and 2019, respectively. Mr. Yoo, Jeong-bok, Mayor of Incheon Metropolitan City, Republic of Korea
		Mr. Yoo Jeong-bok is the Mayor of Incheon Metropolitan City, Republic of Korea. Born in Incheon in 1957, Mayor
		Yoo Jeong-bok earned a Bachelor's degree in Political Science at Yonsei University and a Master's degree in Public Administration at Seoul National University, and completed the Doctoral Program in Political Science at Yonsei University. After passing the Senior Civil Service Examination for Administrative Service as a university student, Mr. Yoo started his career as a senior public official, then became the country's youngest governor (Gimpo County) and mayor of district office (Seo-gu, Incheon). He is the only South Korean politician who held major public positions twice or more, having served as the National Assembly member (three times), Minister (twice), and Mayor of local government (twice). Moreover, during his tenure as the National Assembly member, Mr. Yoo also served as the Minister for Food, Agriculture, Forestry and Fisheries and Minister for Security and Public Administration. As two-time mayor of Incheon, he served as the President of Governors Association of the Republic of Korea as well.



Ms. Anna Joubin-Bret, Secretary, United Nations Commission on International Trade Law (UNCITRAL)

Ms. Anna Joubin-Bret is the Secretary of the United Nations Commission on International Trade Law (UNCITRAL) and the Director of the International Trade Law Division in the Office of Legal Affairs of the United Nations, which functions as the substantive secretariat for UNCITRAL. She is the ninth Secretary of the Commission since it was established by the General Assembly in 1966.

Prior to her appointment on 24 November 2017, Ms. Joubin-Bret practiced law in Paris, specializing in International Investment Law and Investment Dispute Resolution. She focused on serving as counsel, arbitrator, mediator and conciliator in international investment disputes. She served as arbitrator in several ICSID, UNCITRAL and ICC disputes. Prior to 2011 and for 15 years, Ms. Joubin-Bret was the Senior Legal Adviser for the United Nations Conference on Trade and Development (UNCTAD). She edited and authored seminal research and publications on international investment law, notably the Sequels to UNCTAD IIA Series and co-edited with Jean Kalicki a book on Reform of Investor-State Dispute Settlement in 2015.

Ms. Joubin-Bret holds a post-graduate degree (DEA) in Private International Law from the University of Paris I, Panthéon-Sorbonne, a Masters Degree in International Economic Law from University Paris I and in Political Science from Institut d'Etudes Politiques. She was Legal Counsel in the legal department of the Schneider Group, General Counsel of the KIS Group and Director-Export of Pomagalski S.A. She was appointed judge at the Commercial Court of Grenoble (France) and was elected Regional Counsellor of the Rhône-Alpes Region in 1998.

Dr. Eiman Al-Mutairi, Vice Minister of Commerce and CEO of the National Competitiveness Center (NCC), Kingdom of Saudi Arabia

Dr. Eiman Al-Mutairi was appointed by Royal Decree in December 2018 as Assistant Minister to His Excellency The Minister of Commerce and Investment, bringing a 24-year professional experience in both the public and private sector to her new position. Currently, she also leads the National Competitiveness Center (NCC), tasked with improving the regulatory and policy environment for doing business in the kingdom and raising its competitiveness.

During her current position, she was also Head of the Human Capability Development Program office for one year. Before assuming her current positions, Dr. Al-Mutairi headed in 2017 the Saudi Arabia General Investment Authority (SAGIA) Transformation Office. Prior to that she was the Manager of Johns Hopkins Aramco Healthcare Joint Venture Integration Project, and managed hospital operations, including managing all hospital and support program expansions, and establishing the Quality Improvement and Risk Management Division in Saudi Aramco Medical Services Organization. Earlier in her career, she worked as the head of the Saudi Aramco workforce planning and analytics department to develop the Company's workforce profile. She is currently a member of a number of business organizations, such as the Board of Trustees at the Royal University for Women in Bahrain and a member of the American College for Healthcare Executives. Dr. Eiman Al-Mutairi received her undergraduate degree in Chemistry from King Faisal University, her Doctorate Degree in Bio-Organic Chemistry from the University of Bristol in the UK, and her Postdoctoral Fellowship in Genetics/Molecular Biology from Harvard University, USA. She also holds a Certification in Executive Coaching from the University of Reading, the Henley Business School, UK.



Mr. Satvinder Singh, Deputy Secretary-General for the ASEAN Economic Community, the ASEAN Secretariat Mr. Satvinder Singh is the Deputy Secretary-General for ASEAN Economic Community for 2021-2024. In his capacity as the Deputy Secretary-General, he provides strategic advice to the Secretary-General of ASEAN for advancing ASEAN's economic integration agenda as well as to lead the ASEAN Economic Community (AEC) Department of the ASEAN Secretariat in implementing the AEC Blueprint 2025.

Before assuming this role, he was the Assistant Chief Executive Officer, Trade Connectivity & Business Services at Enterprise Singapore. With over 27 years of experience in holding a variety of local, regional and global management positions across the region, he was instrumental in strengthening Singapore's role as Asia's trading hub as well as driving digitalisation efforts in Singapore amidst the COVID-19 pandemic.

Mr. Singh holds a bachelor's degree in social sciences from the National University of Singapore and attended the Harvard's Business School Advanced Management Programme in 2017.

Mr. Luca Castellani, Legal Officer, United Nations Commission on International Trade Law (UNCITRAL)

Mr. Luca Castellani is a legal officer in the Secretariat of the United Nations Commission on International Trade Law (UNCITRAL). As secretary of UNCITRAL Working Group IV (Electronic Commerce), he oversaw the preparation of the UNCITRAL Model Law on Electronic Transferable Records and of the UNCITRAL Model Law on the Use and Cross-border Recognition of Identity Management and Trust Services. He has assisted several countries, including the Maldives, in the enactment of UNCITRAL texts on electronic commerce. In the field of sales law, he actively promotes participation in the UN Convention on Contracts for International Sale of Goods (CISG) and has coordinated the preparation of the UNCITRAL, HCCH and Unidroit Legal Guide to Uniform Instruments in the Area of International Commercial Contracts, with a Focus on Sales. He has published several articles on international business transactions law and comparative law, namely sale of goods, electronic commerce and trade law reform in developing countries.



Mr. Steven Beck, Head, Trade and Supply Chain Finance, Private Sector Operations Department, Asian Development Bank (ADB)

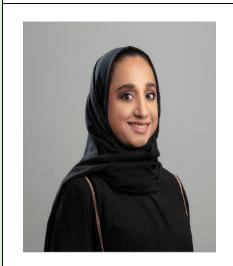
Mr. Steven Beck is the Head of Trade and Supply Chain Finance at the Asian Development Bank (ADB), a program which supports over 10,000 transactions worth about \$8 billion annually. In his fifteen years at the ADB, Mr. Beck has led the program to exponential growth, and has launched multiple initiatives to make trade and supply chains green, resilient, transparent, and socially responsible. Mr. Beck established the first and only authoritative source of default and loss data in trade financing at the peak of the 2008 Financial Crisis, reshaping the regulatory treatment of trade finance and freeing up billions in additional financing capacity as a result. More recently, Mr. Beck launched ADB's groundbreaking analysis on global unmet demand for trade finance, highlighting the imperative to address this market failure to create transformative economic benefits, particularly across developing Asia, and in support of small businesses across the region.

ADB's Trade and Supply Chain Finance Program has been a champion of the digitalization of global trade, with Mr. Beck driving the creation of the Digital Standards Initiative (DSI) in partnership with the Government of Singapore and International Chamber of Commerce. Under Mr. Beck's leadership, a gender audit was conducted of ADB partner commercial banks to develop specific recommendations to attract, retain, and promote more women in banking. Mr. Beck mandates the team at ADB to actively develop projects that advance prosperity and inclusion through trade; these include initiatives to combat money laundering in trade, efforts to increase traceability of carbon emissions and sustainability in global supply chains as well as solutions targeting greater adoption of social and labour safety standards in international commerce. He serves on industry bodies, including the Governing Board of the Digital Standards Initiative and the World Trade Organization (WTO) Working Group for Trade Finance and others. Mr. Beck is a member of Advisory Council of the International Financial Reporting Standards Foundation, providing strategic advice on international accounting and sustainability reporting standards. Mr. Beck began his career with roles as a special assistant to the Canadian minister for international trade and as a senior manager at the Canadian Imperial Bank of Commerce (CIBC). He left CIBC to help start up a new multilateral development bank, the Black Sea Trade & Development Bank (BSTDB), which focused on economic development in Türkiye, Russia and countries of the former Soviet Union. Following BSTDB, he took up roles as a senior consultant, including work with the United States Agency for International Development in southern Africa. He holds an M.A. from the Fletcher School at Tufts University, USA and a B.A. from Queen's University, Canada.



Mr. Phattharaphon Ratanasuvan, SVP, Trade Finance Product, Bangkok Bank PCL, Thailand

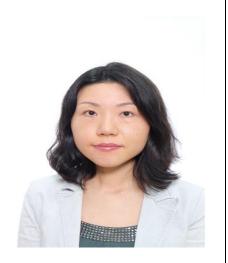

He is currently looking after Trade Product Management at Bangkok Bank, where he leads the efforts in driving trade business as well as trade digitization and innovation. Prior to this, he held several Trade Finance positions at Siam Commercial Bank and Citibank Thailand.

Ms. Lucy Wong is an Advisor at the Bank for International Settlements Innovation Hub (BISIH). She is currently leading on innovation projects focusing on stablecoins, central bank digital currencies (CBDCs) and deposit tokens.

Prior to the BISIH, Ms. Wong was a Manager at the Hong Kong Monetary Authority (HKMA) working on banking crisis prevention and management. During her time at the HKMA, she led the development of the HKMA's policy on Operational Continuity in Resolution, including addressing the implications of adoption of FinTech by the banking industry on operational continuity. She also represented the HKMA in participating in the Financial Stability Board's development of guidance related to bank resolution.

Before the HKMA, she was a Director at Standard Chartered Bank working across a number of functions including Asset & Liability Management, Corporate Banking, Debt Capital Markets and Group Treasury. During her time at Corporate Banking, she managed a portfolio of large corporate clients in the Nordic region and led a team of product specialists in the development of various products for the clients including payments, cash management, supply chain solutions, bonds, structured export finance and structured trade finance.

Ms. Khanit Phatong is the Executive Advisor and Chief Information Officer at Electronic Transactions Development Agency (ETDA), Thailand. She is responsible for analyzing relevant electronic transaction standards and emerging innovations to invent innovative solutions aligned with organizational, national strategiesto support and promote digital identities (Digital ID) in Thailand, in addition, to explore and study relevant standards and technologies to accommodate the adoption of digital ID for Thai citizen. Moreover, to encourage digital transformation among government agencies by exploring and studying relevant standards and technologies to transform paper licenses to digital licenses for both domestic and cross-border transactions. She is also facilitating Thai blockchain consortium – the consortium that comprises with both public and private sectors to cooperate the decentralized ledger network called Thai Blockchain Services Infrastructure or TBSI. Ms. Phatong assisted a pilot project National Digital Trade Platform (NDTP) - the platform that facilitated cross-border digital trade transactions. She had carried out e-Tax invoice by e-mail project which a joint project among ETDA and Revenue Department of Thailand. It was a project to create a platform that let sellers submit e-Tax invoices to buyers via email and leverage the PKI technology for trusted document through e-Timestamping solution. Furthermore, she led the research project to implement the mobile authentication prototype and studied how to use PKI technology in practical ways for authenticating and digital signing by using mobile devices. Prior to taking the role at ETDA, Ms. Phatong experienced in improving core-banking replacement project and customer information system implementation project while working at IBM Delivery, Co. Ltd. THAILAND. Ms. Phatong earned a Bachelor's in Computer Engineering, Faculty of Engineering, from Chiangmai University in Thailand, a Master's in Computer Engineering, from Case Western University, Cleveland, Ohio, USA, and a Master of Business Management, SASIN, Chulalongkorn University, Thailand.

Dr. Hyeon Kyun Lee, Senior Research Fellow, Korean Society of Law / Adjunction Professor, Hannam University School of Law, Republic of Korea

Dr. Hyeon Kyun Lee conducts legal research and gives lectures in the fields of commercial law, financial law and maritime law.

He workes as a researcher at the KLRI (Korea Legal Research Institute) and Research Professor at Korea University, School of Law.

Currently, Dr. Lee works as a Senior Research Fellow for the trading team at the Korean Law Institute. Further, he lectures commercial law at the Hannam University, School of Law in Daejon, Republic of Korea.

Dr. Lee also has been holding the position of Executive Director at the Korean Maritime Law Association.
